MATCH

GUERNSEY experienced a second disappointment in as many days at the Indian Association yesterday. On Monday, they were in a very commanding position with the bat against Norway before rain ruined proceedings. Then, on the same ground 24 hours later against Malaysia, one of the strongest sides in the Pepsi ICC World Cricket League Division Six, their match went to a nail-biting last over before the Malaysians broke the Sarnians' hearts by grabbing a four wicket victory.

It would have been the islanders' first win of the competition after going down to Singapore and Bahrain. 'We should have won,' said Guernsey manager Dave Hearse. 'It's disappointing for the boys as we told them to up their games and by and large they did that. Overall the performance was better.'

Due to the torrential rain the day before, the match was put back from 10am to 12noon start and was reduced to 45 overs. After winning the toss and batting first, the star for Guernsey with the bat was Jeremy Frith. The number three made 79 and was well supported by his captain, Stuart Le Prevost. Together the pair put on 69 for the fourth wicket. Kris Moherndl chipped in with a useful 17 at number six and Tom Kimber hit a beautiful straight six off his first ball in his useful 10 at the end. Guernsey were aiming for 230 to 240 but had to make do with 212. 'We were just a few short of what a par score would have been,' said Hearse.

While the Malaysian bowling attack was rather unimaginative, it was known that they could bat and openers Thushara Kodikara and Rakesh Madhavan took advantage of some initial wayward bowling from new ball bowlers Lee Savident and Jonny Warr on his debut. They put on 19 runs in the first two overs. 'Nineteen off two overs and that took the pressure off them,' said Hearse. Former Hampshire all-rounder Savident was first to react as he trapped the little opener Kodikara plumb in front and then Warr had number three Ahamed Faiz caught by Frith at mid-off. Warr came back in fine style from his first over that went for nine as he returned with the figures 9-2-20-1. 'Special mention should go to Jonny,' said Hearse. 'It was a very good start for the young man. I'm pleased for him.'

Guernsey were then buoyed when Moherndl brilliantly ran out Madhavan with a direct hit from point. It was one of those moments that feel like they are a game turner. But the Greens' spirits were gradually deflated as Malaysian captain Suhan Alagaratanam and Aminudin Ramly began to take the match away from Guernsey as they both worked the ball around expertly. They had put on close to 100 for the fourth wicket before the wicket that Guernsey so desperately craved came as Savident ran out Ramly for 52. The score was 137

for four. Guernsey's tired and weary spirits were lifted again when both Damith Warusavithana and Mohammed Shaifq went in quick succession. But with the big hitting Manrick Singh joining Alagaratanam, who was struggling with cramp and had to have a runner, they proceeded to sour the Guernsey mood once more.

Requiring 35 runs off five overs, they brought it down to needing just three runs off the last over, which was bowled by Gary Rich and when Singh launched the off spinner for a massive straight six off the first ball, the game was theirs. Alagaratanam ended up unbeaten on 80.
